Dear Friends of the Alliance,

To every thing there is a season and at this time I am filled with gratitude to those who have been able to attend the lectures and events and to financially support Holocaust and Genocide education. The participation of members of the community and local students during the annual series at Sonoma State continues to exceed our expectations. And I am grateful to the resiliency reflected in our community as we have coped with recovery from fire, the shattering impact of the shootings in Pittsburgh, and growing intolerance in our world.

It was another exceptional year for the Alliance due to the energy and commitment of our Board members: Myrna Goodman, the Director of the Center for the Study of the Holocaust and Genocide; and Diane Parness' leadership as the Academic Coordinator of the Lecture Series. Please see their reports, as well as Arline Thomas' on the work of our Education Committee that scheduled presentations at local middle and high schools, as well as religious and service organizations. We especially encourage Holocaust and genocide survivors and their descendants to consider assisting us in educating local students about the impact of intolerance.

We were saddened by the deaths of two local Holocaust survivors in 2018: **Susy Raful** and **Isak Zaidlin**, both of whom will be remembered at the annual **Sylvia G. Sucher Memorial Lecture** on April 2nd.

This year we are planning a special event to honor local Holocaust and genocide survivors and their descendants. Do save the date for this event which includes a special showing of the Holocaust documentary film *Big Sonia* at Sonoma State on March 10th.

Members of the Board hosted a special event in conjunction with Hans Angress' retirement from the Board after many years of service. They also tabled at each of the lectures in the 2018 series and the Community-Wide and Congregation Shomrei Torah Yom Hashoah commemorations. We also supported local events marking the 103nd Anniversary of the Armenian Genocide and the commemoration of the 1994 Genocide of the Tutsis in Rwanda, Kwibuka 24. We participated in events sponsored by our sister organizations: the Armenians of the North Bay, the Rwandan Community of California (TRCC), and the Friends of Rwanda Association (FORA). We were able to support both the JCC Jewish Film Series and the Fifth International Genocide Conference held at Sacramento State University. I also had the great honor of coordinating a panel at that conference on Genocide Denial and Its Consequences with Maral Attallah (Humboldt State University) speaking about the Armenian Genocide, Kenneth N. Stern (Director of the Bard Center for the Study of Hate) speaking about the Holocaust and Anti-Semitism, and Gatsinzi Basaninyenzi (Alabama A&M University) speaking about the Genocide Against the Tutsi in Rwanda.

Genocide in Our Time: It Can Happen Here, the theme of the Spring 2019 semester lecture series, will bring a number of new and returning speakers and topics. Much gratitude goes to Diane Parness for coordinating what

we know will be an outstanding series and to Ivan Barta, Miriam Susan Dregéy, Pearl & David S. Furman, Myrna Goodman, Dennis Judd, Her Excellency Mathilde Mukantabana, Chiaya Rawlins, Carol & Ralph Swanson, Arline Thomas, and Carl Van Dyke who are underwriting lectures in the upcoming series.

We hope that you will be able to support the Alliance and allow us to bring speakers to the series who can expand our understanding of the Holocaust and genocide and educate the next generations of students and future educators. We look forward to seeing many new and familiar faces in the coming months. If you can, do attend one (or more) of the lectures and join us afterwards for a no-host dinner with our guest speaker, the faculty, and Alliance Board members. Report from the Center for the Study of the Holocaust and Genocide

This past year has been challenging for organizations supporting Holocaust education and those that diligently hope to stem the increasing tide of anti-Semitism and racial hatred world-wide. The Center was active this year as we joined with over 100 centers and international organizations publicly urging Mark Zuckerberg and Facebook to change their policies of allowing Holocaust denial and anti-Semitic postings to appear freely in Facebook's newsfeeds. As of this date, it appears the initiative has had some effect.

In light of the news that anti-Semitic attacks have increased dramatically worldwide over the last year and the recent horrible tragedy in Pittsburgh, our mission to use education in the service of preventing prejudice is more urgent than ever.

The 2019 Holocaust and Genocide Lecture Series schedule is the strongest we have ever planned. Professor Parness has arranged a powerful line-up for this year. Our thanks to her for her continuing excellent stewardship of the Series as we approach our 36th year.

Immeasurable thanks as well to the Alliance Board of Directors for their diligence and hard work in supporting the Lecture Series. The efforts of the Education Committee have been increasingly influential in bringing the lived experiences of Holocaust and Genocide survivors and their families to the students in Sonoma County. The Alliance continues to be a powerful influence in the important work of Holocaust and Genocide education in Sonoma County.

As always, we hope you can attend our lectures and we look forward to seeing you this coming semester.

Report from the Alliance Education Committee

In January 2018, the Alliance Education Committee continued its tradition of sending a letter to the principals of all Sonoma County public and private middle and high schools. Our intent was to familiarize them with the resources available to teachers: the lecture series schedule, access to video archives of prior lectures through YouTube, and opportunities to arrange for presentations in their classrooms and assemblies by Holocaust and Genocide survivors and their descendants.

The Alliance Education Committee was extremely successful in 2017-2018 in coordinating speakers for classrooms presentations, as well as for the Sebastopol Sunrise Rotary, the Rohnert Park Chamber of Commerce, Bethlehem Lutheran Church, and the North Bay Chapter of Hadassah. We supported 28 classroom presentations that reached 2,095 students and adults and 70 teachers. These presentations are an integral party of "Our Work: outreach to our community, schools and survivor groups." We also work collaboratively with Jewish Family and Children's Services Holocaust Center in San Francisco in responding to speaker bureau requests they receive from schools in Sonoma County. Our speakers are a group of Holocaust survivors, Holocaust descendants, and a third generation Armenian Genocide descendant. They provide a very personal account of the impact of intolerance. "They remember so we don't forget."

The Alliance Education Committee currently has eleven speakers. We launched two new speakers this spring: Gloria Tausk

Glickman and Deborah Rothenberg, both of whom are Holocaust descendants. In addition, two more Holocaust descendants are crafting their biographies with the assistance of a student intern.

The Alliance Education Committee implemented a follow-up teacher survey. We have been able to gather invaluable information with regard to our speakers and how we can best meet the needs of our audiences.

The students continued to express the message of how deeply touched they were by the stories and what a life changing experience it was for them to hear them. They write thank you letters, donate money to the Alliance, and even gave gifts of flowers, candy and plants.

The Alliance Education Committee continues to have a positive and lasting impact with regard to "countering acts of intolerance in Sonoma County."

Report from the Lecture Series Academic Coordinator

It is part of the mission of this lecture series to keep understanding and awareness of the Holocaust and other genocides alive and on the radar of the next generation. We make a concerted effort to bring young scholars and different perspectives to our audience. We accomplished this for our 35th series and I am confident we will succeed again in 2019.

Our 2018 lineup included provocative analyses by Dr. Alexis Herr on the Italian Police During the Holocaust, Maral Attallah on the Armenian Genocide, Prof. Benjamin Madley on the American Genocide, Prof. Ziv Rubinovitz on Rescuers and Survivors in the Israeli Context, and Prof. Evgeny Finkel on The Holocaust, Historical Legacies, and Local Politics.

We were fortunate to welcome back to SSU such distinguished scholars as Prof. James Waller on *Becoming Evil* and Prof. Carol Rittner on Gender and Genocide. Our case studies featured Her Excellency Mathilde Mukantabana, Simon Mudahogora, and Ndahiro Bazimya on Rwanda, Prof. Sergio La Porta on the Armenian Genocide, Dr. Lucia Roncalli on the Cambodian Genocide, and Prof. Kerry Whigham on the politicide in Argentina.

In 2019 we will welcome to SSU some very prominent speakers in the field of genocide studies. Prof. Christopher Browning, author of Ordinary Men, will be one of our first speakers in the series. He will be followed by Prof. Raz Segal, whose topic is Making Hungary Great Again: State Building, Mass Violence, and the Ironies of Global Holocaust Memory. Prof. Peter Hayes will speak on the topic of his recent book: Why? Explaining the Holocaust. Prof. Mehnaz Afridi will talk about Islamophobia and Antisemitism: Differences, Parallels, and Challenges. Prof. Alex Alvarez will return to speak to us about Refugees, Climate Change, and Conflict.

Of special note is the exciting documentary our good friend Christyne Davidian has worked to bring us: Crows of the Desert -A Hero's Journey Through the Armenian Genocide. Our case study presentations will include Irfan Mirza on the Bosnian genocide, Dr. Alexis Herr on Sudan, and Ambassador Mukantabana, Simon Mudahogora and Ndahiro Bazimya will speak to us again of their experience with the genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda. We also look forward to a distinguished panel of local descendants and scholars talking about their personal experiences as members of The Second Generation.

We are very grateful to SSU's own faculty for the contributions they make to our series. 2019 will include presentations by Prof. Stephen Bittner on The Holocaust and Historical Context, Prof. Myrna Goodman on The Concept of Genocide, and Prof. David McCuan providing his expertise on the Syrian genocide.

I am very pleased that we are able to offer a roster of distinguished speakers that serves the goals of our lecture series so well. Our

theme for 2019 is Genocide In Our Time: It Can Happen Here. I hope you will be able to come often and join our important discussion.

2019 Holocaust and Genocide Commemorations and Events

Alliance History

The Alliance for the Study of the Holocaust was formed in 1982 on behalf of the victims and survivors of the Holocaust and the need to tell their stories and for others to learn from their experiences. Those who began this collaborative effort between the community and members of the Sonoma State University faculty promised to let the world know of the atrocities that had occurred. The initial intention was primarily to learn the facts, act on them, and never forget.

As a result of these efforts, a highly successful annual lecture series on the Holocaust and Genocide was created at Sonoma State University. As a University-community partnership, the Board includes members of the community, University faculty and administrators, and students who have participated in the Lecture Series. In 2010, the name of the Alliance was changed to the Alliance for the Study of the Holocaust and Genocide to reflect its revised mission and its continuing educational commitment to include all those affected by genocide.
